1. Research on the Statement and Causal Factors


3. 10 Steps for Creating a Mind Map for GCE AL Economics

Start with the Central Concept: Write "Economics" in the center of the map.

- 2. Add Subtopics: Expand each branch. For example:

- 4. Macroeconomics: GDP, Inflation, Unemployment, Fiscal Policy.
- 5. Use Keywords and Images: Add concise labels, symbols, or images to enhance memory.
